CULAC Upload and Transfer System

What is CUTS?

- **CUTS** is a section of CULAC's website where Credit Unions and State Credit Union Leagues can upload contributor information and transfer contributions in one simple process.

Why should I use CUTS?

- **Free** - Allows you to send your contributions to CULAC at no cost. No more wire fees or spending money on checks and stamps.
- **Accurate** - You can enter all of your contributor information into one standardized spreadsheet that will automatically tell you if you have made any data entry errors.
- **Fast** - The entire process of uploading the spreadsheet and processing the transaction takes less than 5 minutes.

How do I get started?

1. Go to www.cuna.org/cuts (note: you will need a cuna.org login)
2. Download the Contributor Information Template
3. Enter all of the contributor information into the Template
4. Click on **Upload Spreadsheet** and follow the quick and easy steps until completed.

Contributions are not deductible for federal income tax purposes.

Corporate contributions are prohibited by law.

Contributions to CULAC are used to support credit union-friendly candidates in their bids for federal office. Contributions are strictly voluntary and you have the right to refuse to contribute without any reprisal.

In accordance with federal law, CULAC is required to record the name and address of individuals that contribute \$50 or more. This information, along with the contributor's occupation and name of employer for those that contribute in excess of \$200 per calendar year, will be reported on CULAC's regular reports to the Federal Election Commission.
